INSTRUCTIONAL & RECREATIONAL READING

Instructional reading helps students make sense of written language through reading that is connected to a lesson (such as learning about text structures or literary devices). Through teacher supported instructional reading, students cultivate reading skills and print concepts such as phonemic awareness (awareness of word sounds), vocabulary development, and comprehension

As we consider purpose for reading, it is important to keep in mind the importance of both instructional and recreational reading. Learning to read is a life-long process. Both instructional and recreational reading play an important role in this process through the development of literacy skills.

Recreational reading is the reading of any book (in any format) chosen by the student that is not connected to instruction like comprehension questions or summary. Free voluntary reading nurtures the student’s relationship with reading while increasing literacy and developing

vocabulary. Reading for pleasure has an enormous effect on his or her attitude, motivation, and self-esteem toward reading. To grow lifelong learners who have a love of reading, having a balance between instructional and recreational reading is important.
