
Dumplin' by Julie Murphy


Everything, Everything by Nicola Yoon

Laughing at My Nightmare by Shane Burcaw




Nearly Gone by Elle Cosimano

a math whiz from a trailer park, discovers she's the only student capable of unraveling left by a serial killer who's systemically getting rid of her classmates.




Nimona by Noelle Stevenson


Pretending to Be Erica by Michelle Painchaud


The Rig by Joe Duce

Salt to the Sea by Ruta Sepetys



Simon vs. the Homo Sapiens Agenda by Becky Albertalli



Simon is blackmailed. Now Simon must explore his feelings and decide if being outed to the rest of the high school is such a bad thing.




Six of Crows by Leigh Bardugo


Tunnel Vision by Susan Adrian
