We have used APH materials in our high school special education classroom for the past two years while supporting a sophomore student who is blind. During this time, a wide range of APH resources have been incorporated into instruction, including fraction kits, algebra tiles, an abacus, the Monarch, graphic aids for math, cell-building kits, DNA/RNA kits, tactile maps and globes, and life science tactile graphics.

These materials have been invaluable in helping our students access and understand complex academic concepts—from cell structure, DNA replication, and photosynthesis to graphing exponential functions. As a special education teacher without prior experience working with students who are blind, I can confidently say that I would not have been successful in effectively teaching these concepts or ensuring true understanding without APH materials.
