## Digital Book Player Battery Alert

Remember to check your battery level occasionally to see if your player needs recharging.

To find out the level of charge, press the power button to turn on, then press power again. The player will make an announcement of the power charge level amount. If less than 5 hours of charge remains, plug the player into a household outlet to recharge. The player will automatically turn on, press the power button off to fully recharge. It takes about 2 hours to recharge your player.

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**Indications of battery malfunction:**

- Player says “battery charge remaining less than 1 hour” even after charging for several hours.
- Player has been charged but automatically shuts down when not plugged in.
- Player doesn’t hold charge long enough for you to listen comfortably.
- If the battery drops below 1 hour, your player may not recharge.

## **Increasing Your Selection of Audio Books**

The Braille and Talking Book Program offers more than 60,000 books in its collection at the State Library. If an individual wants more books there are over 25,000 titles that can be downloaded from the National Library Service. But sometimes a person just can't find that one title he wants. If that is the case, don't forget to check out your local public library. Public libraries offer audio books and large print books. Many public libraries also have downloadable audio and ebooks.

In South Dakota over 40 public libraries offer downloadable audio and ebooks through South Dakota Titles to Go powered by OverDrive. Some public libraries also offer audio books through OneClick-Digital.

The audio books in these collections can be played on your digital player as long as they are available as an MP3 file. Not all titles are available in MP3

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format, so that is something to be aware of.

If you have not used OverDrive before you must first download the (free) OverDrive Media Console software to your computer.

Once you have found a book in OverDrive which has the option of MP3 format and is available to checkout you download the audio book.

The OverDrive Media Console on your computer will display any books you currently have downloaded.

You can either select a book, and click on Transfer in the top bar, or right-click on the title and select transfer.

A pop-up window will appear called "OverDrive Media Console Transfer Wizard"

With a USB flash drive connected to your computer click Next

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The computer will search for any devices that can have files transferred to them.

The "Player" field dropdown will show the available choices that you can transfer the audio files to.

Select the USB flash drive which is connected to your computer and click Next.

When the files are completely transferred click on Finish.

Remove the USB flash drive from your computer and connect to the USB port (which may be covered by a plastic tab) on the side of the NLS Digital Talking Book Player.

Turn your player on and the book will begin playing.

Note: The OverDrive and OneClickDigital audio books will not play if you have books from NLS downloaded on the flash drive or digital cartridge.

Reacher came to life on the page. I have always been drawn to a suspense filled story.


**61 Hours: a Reacher Novel by Lee Child**


A humorous writer, Janet Evanovich, makes you laugh out loud with her crazy characters. One reader described her to me as "a little far-fetched".










