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Develop and Use a Selection Policy

A well-defined <u>collection development policy</u> guides decision-making and ensures consistency. Your policy should include:

- Goals and Purpose: State the primary objectives of your library collection.
- Selection Criteria: Define the specific factors for evaluating materials, such as alignment with curriculum, reading level, quality of content, and factual accuracy.
- Process for Handling Challenges: Include a clear procedure for addressing concerns about materials.
- Ensure your policy is regularly reviewed and readily available for reference.

Step-by-Step Selection Process

Follow a systematic process for evaluating and acquiring books:

- Consult Reputable Reviews: Use professional sources for objective evaluations of materials.
- Assess Curriculum Needs: Align purchases with current academic standards and identified gaps in the collection.
- Examine the Content: Evaluate books for age-appropriateness, readability, and quality of information.
- Utilize Teacher and Student Input: Gather feedback to identify materials that support learning and recreational interests.
- Maintain records of your selection decisions to document the rationale behind purchases.

Understanding South Dakota House Bill 1197

House Bill 1197 requires schools to have filters or filtered internet service and a policy in place to "restrict minors from accessing obscene matter or materials." Schools will also be required to publish the policy on their website or annually in a newspaper. Learn more here.

Building a strong collection doesn't stop with book selection. Regular maintenance ensures its continued relevance:

- <u>Weeding</u>: Use methods like the CREW process to remove outdated, damaged, or unused materials.
- Ongoing Evaluation: Identify gaps or areas needing expansion based on curriculum updates and usage patterns.
- New Acquisitions: Stay informed about newly published books.
