This month, we are proud to spotlight SATL awardee Mikayla Arechigo, librarian at Aberdeen Central High School. Mikayla's innovative and student-centered approach to teaching exemplifies best practices in school librarianship. From co-teaching a nonfiction reading unit with 10th-grade Language Arts to transforming her library into a hub of excitement with the annual "Book Madness" tournament, Mikayla fosters a vibrant culture of reading and learning. Her teaching practices emphasize student voice and choice, thoughtful planning, and reflective improvement, while her engaging displays, tech integration, and collaborative efforts elevate the library as a dynamic space for the entire school community.

Best Practice in Action: Teaching & Learning

Mikayla planned and co-taught a nonfiction reading unit that introduced students to the Dewey Decimal System, library layout, and a book tasting experience. She tailored resources based on student interest and collaborated with classroom teachers to ensure cross-curricular alignment.

Book Madness: Reading Gets Competitive!

Every March, Mikayla hosts Book Madness, a 7-week bracket-style tournament featuring award-winning books. Students and staff vote weekly, track rankings, and celebrate both literature and school pride. Trophies from nearly a century of school history accompany the live bracket display!

Technology Tools in Use

Instructional tech is seamlessly integrated into Mikayla's program. Students use Google Forms, Smore, and collaborative documents throughout the nonfiction unit. She also teaches digital literacy lessons on databases, SORA, the online catalog, and Chromebook usage.
