Public Library Tip

Establish Simple Routines

Daily

Weekly

- ✓ Refresh displays.
- ✓ Promote programs.
- ✓ Review supplies and materials.
- ✓ Connect with community partners.
- ✓ Update library communications.

Monthly

- ✓ Evaluate programs.
- ✓ Review collection needs.
- ✓ Refresh promotional materials.
- ✓ Reflect on successes and opportunities.

Create a Welcoming Library

People should feel comfortable from the moment they walk through the door. A welcoming atmosphere encourages people to return again and again. Consider:

- clear signage
- inviting displays
- organized shelves
- accessible spaces
- friendly customer service
- comfortable gathering areas

Build an Engaging Collection

An effective collection reflects the interests and needs of your community, and collections are most valuable when they are actively used. Regularly:

- monitor circulation trends
- replace worn materials
- remove outdated resources
- add materials that support community interests
- highlight new and popular items

Offer Meaningful Programs

Programs help bring the library to life, and successful programming doesn't have to be elaborate. Remember that quality matters more than quantity, and then start with community interests and build from there.

Programs might include:

- storytimes
- book discussions
- technology assistance
- craft activities
- local history presentations
- community conversations
- lifelong learning opportunities

Share Your Story

One of the most important things a library can do is tell people about its impact. Sharing your story helps people understand the value of their public library. Celebrate:

- successful programs
- community partnerships
- patron success stories
- new resources
- library milestones
